A one-day workshop titled "Role of Information Technology in NAAC Self-Study Report" was conducted for all teaching and non-teaching staff members to enhance their understanding and application of IT in accreditation processes.
A Women's Self-Defense Program, "Sashkat Nari Sashkat Samaj", was organized in collaboration with NCC, training 32 girl students in self-defense techniques. Additionally, a 10-Day Summer Camp on "Graphic Designing and Video Editing" was conducted in collaboration

with IT Club Avinya, with 47 students actively participating and successfully completing the program.

The IQAC initiated a Post-Orientation Program for final-year students under the banner of "Next Steps Symposium", in collaboration with the Training and Placement Cell. 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Maharana Pratap Govt. Degree College Amb has strategically implemented the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) within its academic framework, aligning with the directives set forth by Himachal Pradesh University. This system, introduced in the 2013-14 academic session for undergraduate programs and the 2022-23 academic session for postgraduate programs, empowers students to tailor their academic journey by selecting courses aligned with their interests and career aspirations. Adherence to the guidelines and syllabus prescribed by Himachal Pradesh University ensures a standardized and enriching learning experience. In collaboration with HPKVN, the college has expanded its academic offerings by incorporating multidisciplinary add-on courses, such as EEE (English Employability and Entrepreneurship). This strategic partnership aims to diversify students' skill sets and foster interdisciplinary learning. The institution is committed to further broadening the spectrum of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary courses in the coming academic sessions. This includes the planned introduction of skill enhancement courses, generic elective courses, and ability enhancement courses. Open to all students, these courses aim to provide a holistic and flexible education that aligns with the evolving needs of the student body. Currently, the college offers multidisciplinary courses such as Environmental Studies and MIL (Modern Indian Languages: English, Hindi, and Sanskrit), addressing the diverse interests and aspirations of its students. Additionally, under a self-financing scheme, the college provides professional courses like BBA, BCA, and PGDCA, offering students opportunities for specialization and skill development. As Maharana Pratap Govt. Degree College Amb looks toward the future, it remains dedicated to enhancing the academic landscape by continually expanding its offerings and embracing innovative pedagogical approaches. This commitment underscores the institution's focus on fostering a dynamic, inclusive, and well-rounded educational environment for its students.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

In accordance with the directives outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) serves as a pivotal service for students enrolled in undergraduate and

postgraduate degree programs. This initiative operates within the framework established by the National Academic Depository and is facilitated through Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, which holds an A grade accreditation by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). At Maharana Pratap Govt. Degree College Amb, all students have successfully created their ABC IDs, a process that is mandatory for participation in examinations. Students are required to maintain an active ABC ID to ensure compliance with examination requirements and to access the benefits offered under this system. It is important to note that our institution functions as an affiliated college under Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla. As such, the authority to confer degrees or diplomas via the ABC Portal rests solely with the affiliating university. The issuance of academic credentials remains under the jurisdiction of Himachal Pradesh University. Our institution remains committed to adhering to the guidelines and procedures set forth by Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, and continues to support students in leveraging the benefits of the Academic Bank of Credit system to enhance their academic journey.

17.Skill development:

In augmentation of the extant array of Undergraduate and Postgraduate courses offered at the institution, the college has implemented a strategic initiative by introducing skill-oriented professional courses. Specifically, courses such as B.C.A. (Bachelor of Computer Applications), B.B.A. (Bachelor of Business Administration), and PGDCA (Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications) are currently operational under a self-finance scheme. Additionally, the institution offers B.Sc. Computer Science as a regular government course, further broadening the scope of specialized education available to students. This diversification aims to cater to the dynamic demands of the contemporary academic landscape and facilitate specialized education in the realms of computer applications, business administration, and science. Moreover, the institution has established collaborative endeavors with HPKVN Shimla to offer courses such as EEE (English Employability and Entrepreneurship). These collaborations enrich the academic fabric by providing students with multidisciplinary exposure and fostering practical skills relevant to the industry. Recognizing the importance of digital literacy, the college has instituted the Spoken Tutorial Programme, administered by IIT Bombay, aimed at developing fundamental skills in computers, internet usage, and software applications among the student body. During the current academic session, 80 students were trained in Disaster Management, and 32 girls received training in self-defense.

Additionally, 47 students were trained in Graphic Designing and Video Editing during a 10-day summer camp organized by the IT Club. Further 74 students were also trained on image processing through python during one month online camp organised by IT club of the college. The institution also conducted a variety of skill development activities through NCC, NSS, R&R, and various other clubs and societies functioning within the college, fostering a comprehensive approach to student growth and engagement. In line with the commitment to holistic skill development, students are encouraged to access SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds) and MOOC (Massive Open Online Course) platforms. Awareness drives within the college and mentor-led sessions create an environment conducive to leveraging these platforms for comprehensive skill enhancement. The institution's dedication to holistic student development is further underscored by a series of initiatives facilitated by the Placement and Career Counseling Cell. Career counseling workshops, career awareness sessions, and guest lectures are organized, providing students with valuable insights, guidance, and exposure to real-world professional scenarios. These initiatives collectively contribute to the holistic educational experience offered at the college, fostering both academic excellence and practical proficiency among its student community.

Further strengthening the technological infrastructure, the college offers a sufficient number of smart classrooms and a state-of-the-art virtual classroom. These facilities cater to the growing demand for technology-enhanced education, providing an interactive and engaging space for both offline and virtual learning experiences. During this academic session, the college also conducted a one month online camp on image processing through python, which attracted an enrollment of 74 students, all of whom successfully completed the program. This initiative highlights the institution's commitment to equipping students with practical and industry-relevant skills in emerging fields. As an affiliated college of Himachal Pradesh University Shimla, the institution has historically been constrained in its ability to launch independent online or distance education courses. However, with the implementation of the National Education Policy (NEP), new opportunities have emerged for institutions to design and offer their own online programs. In response, the college is actively strategizing the launch of Diploma courses in the online mode, aligning with the NEP's transformative vision to provide accessible, diverse, and technology-driven education. This forward-thinking approach reflects the institution's commitment to staying ahead of contemporary pedagogical trends while ensuring that students are well-prepared to meet the demands of an increasingly digital and interconnected world. 1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Since our college is affiliated with H.P. University, Shimla, So it strictly adheres to the university's mandated curriculum for its diverse range of courses, operating within the regulatory framework established by the university. This ensures uniformity, academic integrity, and compliance, precluding any independent integration of alternative curricula.

Environmental Science is a compulsory subject for all undergraduate programs, and its successful completion is a prerequisite for students' progression to the second year. Additionally, the B.A. 3rd-year curriculum for Political Science students includes a specialized course on Human Rights, Gender, and Environment. The curriculum developed by Himachal Pradesh University (HPU) emphasizes student-focused methodologies, incorporating experiential, participative, and problem-solving learning approaches to enhance the educational experience. INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The educational institution boasts a comprehensive infrastructure and physical resources to support a wide array of academic and extracurricular activities. Its facilities include classrooms, laboratories, recreational areas, gymnasiums, and state-of-the-art computer equipment. The campus is divided into five main buildings: the Arts & Science Block, Commerce Block, Self-Financing Block, IT Block, and Admin Block.

Key resources include:

- Classrooms: 24, including 7ICT-enabled smart classrooms and 1 virtual classroom-cum-conference hall.

- **Laboratories:** 2 chemistry labs, 2 physics labs, 1 botany lab, 1 zoology lab, and 3 computer labs.
- **Other facilities:** 1 music room, a Girls' Common Room, Sick Room, NCC Room, NSS Room, Gym, and CSCA Room, e-Suvidha Centre, Day care centre, Skill development centre.
- **Libraries:** A central library, a digital library section, a reading room, and a dedicated library for self-financing students.
- **Seminar Hall:** A multipurpose/seminar hall with a seating capacity of 250.

The campus features ample recreational spaces, including volleyball and basketball courts, and provides 84 computers exclusively for teaching and learning. Its classrooms and an examination hall together accommodate over 2,200 students. Wi-Fi and internet access are available in select areas such as libraries, the admin block, computer labs, and smart classrooms.

A new Commerce Block is under construction and is expected to be completed within six months. Positive feedback from students highlights the effectiveness of the infrastructure in creating a holistic educational environment.

The college features an expansive open area of over 5,000 square meters, dedicated to sports and cultural activities. Key sports facilities include:

- A 200 sq. m synthetic volleyball court
- A 600 sq. m synthetic basketball court
- A 90 sq. m synthetic badminton court
- A 2,000 sq. m athletics field for various events

Additionally, the college houses a fully-equipped gym, a boxing ring, a boxing platform and a specialized Physical Education

department that manages all sports activities. Students have access to an extensive range of indoor and outdoor sports equipment, including chess boards, table tennis, badminton, volleyball, basketball, Athletics and cricket gear.

For cultural activities, the college provides:

- A 2,000 sq. m open area with a 150 sq. m stage equipped with roofing for events and functions
- An interlocking tile-paved area spanning 1,000 sq. m, accommodating up to 500 students for gatherings
- An indoor multipurpose hall with seating for 250 students

A dedicated music room, stocked with various Indian classical and folk instruments, further enhances the cultural vibrancy of the campus.

The library of the educational institution is partially automated, utilizing the advanced SOUL 2.0 software (version 2.0.05) since the academic session of 2021-22 which has been upgraded to SOUL 3.0 this year. First installed in 2017, the software has significantly enhanced the library's operational efficiency. The library consists of a central facility and a self-financed section, collectively housing:

- 14,438 textbooks with a book value of Rs. 13712659
- 391 reference books with a book value of Rs. 207089

The central library features a digital library section equipped with 10 computers and dedicated seating. It subscribes annually to NList, providing free access to e-books, e-journals, e-ShodhSindhu, and Shodhganga. Additional resources include eight newspaper subscriptions and twelve magazines, offering a comprehensive range of learning materials.

The library is also a member of the NDLI Club, further enriching its digital resources. A biometric machine is installed to track footfall, and a dedicated kiosk is available for displaying notices, e-newspapers, and important college website updates.

To enhance facilities, a dedicated reading room near the library is under development to expand seating capacity. These initiatives reflect the institution's dedication to creating a modern, efficient, and resourceful learning environment for its academic community.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

The college emphasizes providing a modern and enriched learning environment through state-of-the-art facilities. Key features include:

- **Smart Classrooms:** Five equipped with Interactive Touch Panels and UPS systems, alongside two with projectors, computer systems, and CCTV cameras.
- **Virtual Classroom-cum-Conference Hall:** Outfitted with an Interactive Touch Panel, camera, microphone, and Chairman Address System.
- **Computer Labs:** Three labs with over 84 operational systems.
- **Research Centre:** Four computers with printing facilities.
- **Digital Library Section:** Equipped with 10 computers.

Connectivity is robust, with five 300 Mbps fiber broadband connections and strategically placed Wi-Fi access points throughout the campus. A partnership with Jio offers unlimited 34 Mbps daily data for all users, while the library features a dedicated 50 Mbps fiber broadband connection with a 300 GB monthly data allowance, extending Wi-Fi to students. Administrative needs are supported by additional 10 Mbps connections with up to 500 GB monthly data.

The college also ensures safety and efficiency with a comprehensive CCTV system, printing and scanning facilities, and UPS backup. Notices are displayed on an LED screen and a functional display panel. A biometric device and a kiosk have been installed in the library for tracking footfall and displaying notices, e-newspapers, and other important information.

These advanced facilities reflect the institution's commitment to fostering an exceptional learning environment for its students.

- **Laboratory Records:** Maintained meticulously by staff under the supervision of the Head of Department (HOD), who oversees physical verification, repairs of serviceable items, and proper disposal of unserviceable equipment.
- **Sports Facilities:** Maintained by a Sports Peon funded by the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA).
- **Infrastructure Maintenance:** Managed by the Building Committee, with the College Development Fund allocated for furniture maintenance and minor repairs.
- **Computer Maintenance:** Supported by the Computer Fund and handled by a dedicated lab assistant.
- **External Maintenance Services:** Technicians, masons, plumbers, carpenters, and gardeners are engaged for the upkeep of toilets, drinking water facilities, gardens, the campus, and the canteen. Regular cleaning of water tanks and refilling of fire extinguishers are also ensured.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) convenes quarterly meetings throughout the year to discuss significant developments and strategic deployment plans for the institution in collaboration with its team members. These sessions are instrumental in ensuring that the annual plan is meticulously designed, taking into account available resources while aligning with the institution's mission and vision.

This year, the IQAC achieved two major milestones in collaboration with various clubs and societies within the college. Firstly, in partnership with the NCC Unit, the IQAC organized the Sashakt Nari Sashakt Samaj Women's Self-Defence Program, which saw active participation from 32 female students. 6.2.2 - The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The institution operates under a regulatory framework governed by multiple entities, including the Government of India, the Ministry of Higher Education, UGC, the Government of Himachal Pradesh's Higher Education Department, and the Director of Higher Education. HPU Shimla serves as the affiliating and examining authority for all courses offered by the institution.

The Principal holds multiple responsibilities, acting as the Head, Chief Tutor, Drawing and Disbursing Officer (DDO), and Director of self-financing courses. Administrative and academic functions are managed by dedicated staff under the overall supervision of the Office Superintendent. Each program has a Senior Programme Tutor, and Heads of Departments (HODs) oversee academic matters within their respective departments. A Bursar, appointed by the Principal, handles financial matters, including purchases coordinated by a specialized Purchase/GeM Committee.

Various committees, led by conveners with 4-7 members, oversee curricular and extracurricular activities. The Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and Higher Education Institution Society (HEIS) function under the college administration to ensure efficient management. These bodies also have the authority to appoint teaching and non-teaching staff to address institutional needs and student welfare.

The college also features a Placement and Career Guidance Cell and an Alumni Association (AAA) to foster holistic development for all stakeholders. Together, the administration, committees, and support structures ensure smooth operation, effective management, and the delivery of high-quality education.

6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non- teaching staff

The college offers various benefits and facilities to its faculty and staff to ensure their well-being and job satisfaction. While medical reimbursement is available to regular staff through the Government, the college itself does not currently provide this benefit. However, self-financed staff members receive timely medical assistance when needed during duty hours. Security guards and sweepers are provided with uniforms and shoes annually.

Residential accommodation is available for teaching staff, with four residences allocated to faculty and an additional residence designated for the Principal. All staff members under self-financing and the Parent Teacher Association (PTA) receive an annual increment, as do regular staff members, following Himachal Pradesh Government regulations.

Leave entitlements vary by employment type. Regular staff members are eligible for 12 days of casual leave, 20 days of earned leave annually, 180 days of maternity leave (up to twice during their career), and 15 days of paternity leave (up to twice during their career), in line with state government rules. Additionally, female employees who experience a miscarriage can avail of 45 days of special medical leave. Staff under self-financing and PTA are entitled to one casual leave per month and are also granted maternity, paternity, and special medical leave equivalent to government employees.

Regular teaching and non-teaching staff members may partially withdraw from their General Provident Fund (GPF) to address family needs. Collectively, these provisions demonstrate the college's commitment to supporting its staff through comprehensive benefits and supportive workplace policies.

In Himachal Pradesh, the performance appraisal system in government colleges is overseen by the Director of Higher Education and the Secretary of Education of the Himachal Pradesh Government, rather than solely by the college Principal. This

system applies to both teaching and non-teaching staff.

For non-teaching staff, Annual Confidential Reports (ACRs) are prepared by the Heads of Departments, endorsed by the Principal, and then appraised by the Director of Higher Education.

For teaching staff, the appraisal process follows the PBAS-API (Performance-Based Appraisal System - Academic Performance Indicator) framework provided by the Higher Education Department. Faculty members complete self-appraisal forms, which are verified and endorsed by the Principal before being submitted to the Director of Higher Education for final evaluation.

Promotions for both teaching and non-teaching staff are directly linked to the outcomes of their respective ACR or PBAS-API evaluations.

For Self-Financed and Parent Teacher Association (PTA) employees, annual appraisals are conducted during meetings of the Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) and PTAs. These appraisals depend on fund availability.

An effectively implemented appraisal system promotes a positive work culture and boosts staff morale, contributing to the overall development of educational institutions

Our institution maintains a rigorous system of financial oversight through both internal and external audits to uphold principles of transparency and accountability. At the close of each fiscal year, internal audits are carried out on the PTA fund, self-finance fund, and NSS funds. For this purpose, a certified Charter Accountant is engaged to ensure a comprehensive evaluation. The local audit department of the state government assumes responsibility for auditing the college's fee and other funds.

Additionally, the Accountant General office in Shimla conducts periodic audits of salaries and government grants. To guarantee meticulous accounting of student funds, the bursar oversees the process, emphasizing proper, economical, efficient, and effective resource utilization. In the event of audit objections, appropriate mechanisms are activated to address them. The principal takes part in advisory committee meetings to discuss and rectify any identified document deficiencies or procedural lapses based on advice received. Audit objections that fall beyond the principal's purview are promptly reported to the Director of Higher Education by the appointed auditor. During the most recent session, an external audit was conducted by the state Accountant General office in February 2022. The processing of salaries and payments is facilitated through the government treasury, ensuring that funds are securely credited to beneficiaries' accounts only after bills are cleared by the Treasury Officer. This method establishes a direct and secure disbursement process.

Procurement begins with requests from departments or committees, and the purchase committee follows specific guidelines for acquiring goods and services. In the absence of such guidelines, priority is given to government-approved agencies in Himachal Pradesh, including the Himachal Pradesh State Electronics Corporation Limited, GIC, and GeM. A dedicated purchase committee oversees general procurement, while a separate GeM Committee handles acquisitions through the Government e-Marketplace, both requiring prior approval from the Principal and conducted under their supervision. Procured items are recorded in Stock Registers and allocated to departments or individuals as needed, with consumable items documented in dedicated registers. Annual stock verifications by designated committees ensure compliance with records. Additionally, funds collected from students, such as the PTA and Amalgamated Funds, are judiciously utilized to address evolving needs, ensuring transparency and efficiency in fund utilization.

Practice 1: Collaborative Programs for Student Development

In partnership with the NCC Unit, the IQAC successfully conducted the Sashakt Nari Sashakt Samaj Women's Self-Defense Program, enabling 32 female students to gain confidence

and essential self-defense skills.

Additionally, through collaboration with the Training and Placement Cell, the IQAC facilitated the Next Step Symposium, a targeted orientation program for final-year students, ensuring they are well-prepared for future academic and professional opportunities. These practices highlight the IQAC's proactive role in reinforcing institutional excellence and operational effectiveness.

The report also identifies shortcomings in the current execution plan, enabling corrective actions in subsequent sessions. At the start of each session, the previous year's analysis is reviewed to integrate

innovative initiatives into future plans. This reflective and forward-looking approach underscores the institution's commitment to refining its practices and achieving sustained academic excellence.

CCTV cameras are installed at key locations, monitored by the Principal's office, and regularly checked. Faculty members also conduct scheduled rounds of the campus to ensure discipline and security.
2. **Counseling:** Faculty members provide counseling to students, including an orientation program at the start of each session to familiarize students with the college environment and emphasize the importance of maintaining discipline.
3. **Common Room:** A well-furnished girls' common room is available, equipped with chairs, beds, fans, a sanitary pad vending machine, and a first aid box. Female faculty members routinely visit the room, ensuring its safety, security, and hygiene are maintained.

Waste management at the college is handled with the utmost priority, incorporating several effective strategies for efficient waste disposal. The campus is equipped with designated bins for biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste, placed strategically to maintain cleanliness. Sanitation workers from the Nagar Panchayat regularly manage the collected waste, ensuring timely disposal from the specified bins. For liquid waste, underground sewage tanks have been installed to ensure the proper disposal of sewage and other liquid waste materials, contributing to a hygienic and environmentally responsible approach. Hazardous chemical and radioactive wastes from the Chemistry lab are carefully managed through pre-installed pipes that direct chemical waste to underground rills, eventually reaching the sewage tanks. This systematic process ensures the safe and controlled disposal of harmful substances. The institution also takes a proactive stance on electronic waste (e-waste), which is stored in a dedicated room for proper disposal. An Mou have been signed with the form Himalayan Cyber security System for disposal of the e-waste. This comprehensive waste management system reflects the college's commitment to environmental responsibility and best practices in waste disposal across all categories.

7.2 - Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

1. Title of the Practice: Aware Students About Road Safety

The college's Road Safety Club aims to educate students about traffic rules, encourage helmet use, and counsel them to help accident victims during the critical "Golden Hour." To address the high rate of road accidents in India, various activities were conducted, including an orientation program on October 11, 2023, and an awareness campaign on February 8, 2024, in collaboration with police officials. Activities like Rangoli, essay writing, slogan writing, Nukkad Nataks, and rallies were organized to promote road safety. The initiative has led students to strictly follow traffic rules, wear helmets, and assist accident victims, despite challenges like convincing people and managing crowded rally routes.

2. Electoral Awareness Campaign

The college launched an Electoral Awareness Campaign to educate students on voting rights, voter card registration, and the Voter Helpline app. The Electoral Literacy Club organized various activities, including essay writing, declamation, and SWEEP programs, with support from district election officers. The initiative aimed to bridge awareness gaps, motivate students above 18 to register and vote, and foster democratic participation. The campaign's success is evident as 82 students applied for voter registration in December 2023. Challenges included limited awareness, misconceptions, and resource constraints.

7.3.2 - Plan of action for the next academic year

In the upcoming session, several upgrades and initiatives will enhance the college infrastructure and environment. The new Commerce block will be completed, and new computers will be distributed to all departments. The botanical garden will be enriched with ornamental plants, flower pots, and plant protection grids, while water storage tanks will be cleaned.
